

Our mission is to reach out and expose diverse groups, especially young audiences, to all forms of the performing, visual, media and literary arts. We accomplish this by engaging professional artist-educators who are inspired by the work they do and have a unique gift for sharing that inspiration with students. Since our founding in 2001, thousands of children across the New York Metro Region have benefited from Wingspan Arts customized arts education programs, which utilize a wide spectrum of arts disciplines to address a variety of developmental areas.

Our programs enable students to have a better view and understanding of a complicated, changing world that can be uniquely and vividly expressed through the arts. This helps fulfill the mission of connecting students to the arts and the arts to life.

Wingspan Arts is committed to making its programs accessible to an economically and culturally diverse population in each of the communities we serve. For this reason, we provide full and partial scholarships to students who cannot afford the tuition of an intensive conservatory program, reduced or tuition free enrollment to qualified students in our afterschool programs and program support for in-school arts education services when inadequate funding is available. We have never turned a child away from any program due to an inability to pay.

Wingspan Arts programs are funded a number of different ways. Some programs in afterschool are tuition-based and receive support from the PTA and local sources. Inschool programs are frequently funded by allocated funds through school districts or by special partnership grants. Wingspan Arts programs also receive generous support from corporations, foundations and individuals. Supporters include New York City Council, National Endowment for the Arts, New York City Department of Cultural Affairs, New York State Council on the Arts, The Jerome Robbins Foundation, The Friars National Association Foundations, Inc., and Lower Manhattan Cultural Council.

Wingspan Arts is a nonprofit 501(c)3 corporation.

Building Community




Discovering Artistry

Program Overview

Wingspan's afterschool programs provide students with an important introduction to a wide range of artistic experiences. We believe that learning through the arts is a unique way for students to understand and engage with the world around them.


By providing our students with these authentic artistic experiences at a young age, we strive to educate the whole child while instilling a passion for the arts and creating lifelong learners. Taught by professional artists in NYC schools, our programs allow students the freedom to develop their unique personalities while exploring and creating in a safe, fun and enriching environment.

The Program Model

Safe: To engage students, we create a safe and nurturing environment so they feel comfortable learning skills, forming relationships and exploring the world around them.

Fun: Our 90-minute arts enrichment classes include a variety of activities to engage students' minds, bodies and imaginations! We provide time before and after our classes where students can play games, read independently, draw or build – activities they get to choose.

Enriching: Our multi-disciplinary classes not only teach students new skills, but encourage them to reflect about what they learn. At the end of the semester, students present galleries, plays, concerts and dances for their peers, parents, and school communities.

Program Highlights

• Wingspan Arts is committed to making sure that all children are able to participate in our programs, regardless of their financial situation. In FY 2011, Wingspan Arts awarded over \$52,000 in scholarships to our afterschool families.

• Over the past four years, we have partnered with many new schools, and now have nine **Club Wingspan** afterschool programs throughout Manhattan, Brooklyn and Queens, as well as programs in Darien, CT.

• Every year, Wingspan Teaching Artists create exciting new classes for their students. Some of these include Recycled Art, All About Muppets, Shakespeare Theatre, Dance Around the World, Art of Science and Afro-Caribbean Drumming.

Program Overview

Conservatory programs strive to create an artistic home for young performers, provide a professional experience in a fun learning environment, and offer curriculum that is both challenging and nurturing.

Programs are designed by Wingspan Artistic Directors and working theatre artists to create a versatile and meaningful experience. Conservatory pushes the boundaries of what students believe they are capable of and challenges their artistic muscles.

Through conservatory programs, Wingspan is establishing a supportive home for students who love theatre and is creating an environment for rising talent to hone their acting craft, develop socially and find mentors in the arts. The Program Model

Summer Conservatory for our middle and high school students consists of an intensive six-week session, during which they receive classes in acting, voice and dance, rehearse for a play or musical, and perform as the culminating event. Our elementary age students explore their imaginations and create original musicals.


School year evening and weekend classes focus on skills building. Class offerings include audition technique, improv, basic acting and college audition preparation.

Cabaret Troupe is an audition-based ensemble for middle and high school students. This musical theatre workshop allows students to focus on individual songs and perform at a professional NYC theatre.

Program Objectives

In-school programs allow students to develop their personal sense of artistry, create a connection with working artists, and provide opportunities to engage with an artistic discipline during the school day.

Residencies are designed in collaboration with school partners. They expand and deepen existing opportunities, offer new artistic experiences, and can support core curriculum in the classroom.

The creative process is essential for each student's artistic growth. In-school programs are inquiry based and provide an outlet for students to share their talents with the school community.

The Program Model

Wingspan Arts works with school leadership to address their arts education needs and create a multi-disciplinary program specific to the school. As each residency is designed, schools have the option to integrate it into the curriculum or to offer the class as an elective.

Professional Teaching Artists write ageappropriate curriculum that is innovative and relevant to the students' current instruction. Wingspan Teaching Artists work in partnership with the school community in order to make the arts learning a unique, authentic experience.

Whether the residency runs ten weeks or for the full school year, it culminates with a student performance or gallery to celebrate the students' achievement.

Our Ten Jear History

Wingspan Arts was founded in Fall 2001 as an after school program at PS 40. The program model included a 90-minute enrichment class taught by a professional teaching artist and was created to allow real arts learning throughout the course of a semester. Our Conservatory, which began the following summer, gave students an opportunity to focus on the arts with classes and rehearsals for a full day. These two programs created the foundation of Wingspan and what our students can accomplish with the arts.

By the fall of 2004 Wingspan had continued our expansion into many other areas of arts education. In addition to the afterschool and summer programming, our in-school programs integrated arts education into the classroom at five schools throughout the metro area. Our roster had grown as well – over 90 teaching artists were working with more than 2000 students during the 2004-05 school year.

As we continue to grow and find more ways to connect the arts to life and the students to the arts, we've maintained our core values: to foster the arts and improve the learning experience for students. In our second decade, we will continue to strengthen our partnerships with school leaders and parents, as well as empower our next generation of artists and audiences. 
